The project commenced late 2017 with fund raising and Global Grant application. The Global Grant was approved and the pre-medical operation phase commenced in May 2018. All planning was completed and the Medical Operations commenced on Monday the 1st October with procedures completed on Friday 12th October and the last patients returning to their homes on Monday 15th October.

In total over 400 potential patients were health checked in the 10 operating days. Many more Fijians had their eyes and health checked in their villages as the screening was done to fund suitable patients. The project is built on a holistic patient care model, from patient home to home with all medical, caring, travel costs and food met by the Rotary Project.

Some minor disruption to the project occurred in the first two days with Fiji wide bad weather closing roads to some remote villages and delaying shipping. Local Rotary and Fiji Society for the Blind swung into action and quickly sourced replacement patients from Taveuni Island whilst awaiting the arrival of the first ferry.



Rotary and the Fijian people are indebted to the surgical team led for the 13th time by Dr.Jeff Rutgard (International Humanitarian Eye Surgeon) ably assisted by Dr David Pendergrast (Auckland Eye Surgeon), Dr Frederico Rupil (Argentinian Eye Surgeon and a Rotarian),



Dr Mark Saunders (New Zealand Eye Surgeon), Dr Lyn Stay (Anaesthetist from the USA), Dr Ieli Fakraufon (Suva based Anaesthetist for general anaesthetic of the children), Dr Greg Booth (Australian GP) and the nursing team (local and international) led by Ineke van Laar.

The Fiji Ministry of Health and Medical Services are a generous supporter of the Taveuni Eye Project each year.

The Fiji Society for the Blind (FSB) were again conducting Fiji wide testing and screening of potential patients. Not only did they screen but also provided valuable health related checks and information to all. Here we see two FSB members attending TEP as carers to ensure the patients both arrive safely and get home after their operations.

Many cannot walk unaided and need to be guided every step of the way. **Well done FSB.**






Happy Patients and Parents in 2018

A total of over 3500 Procedures have been completed in the 13 Rotary Taveuni Eye Projects successfully run since 2007.

Note – In 2005 (1project) and 2006 (2 projects) Rotary Taveuni ran one week outreaches in conjunction with Marine Reach. 2007 had two one week projects and from then on it was deemed more efficient to have one 2 week project per year.
